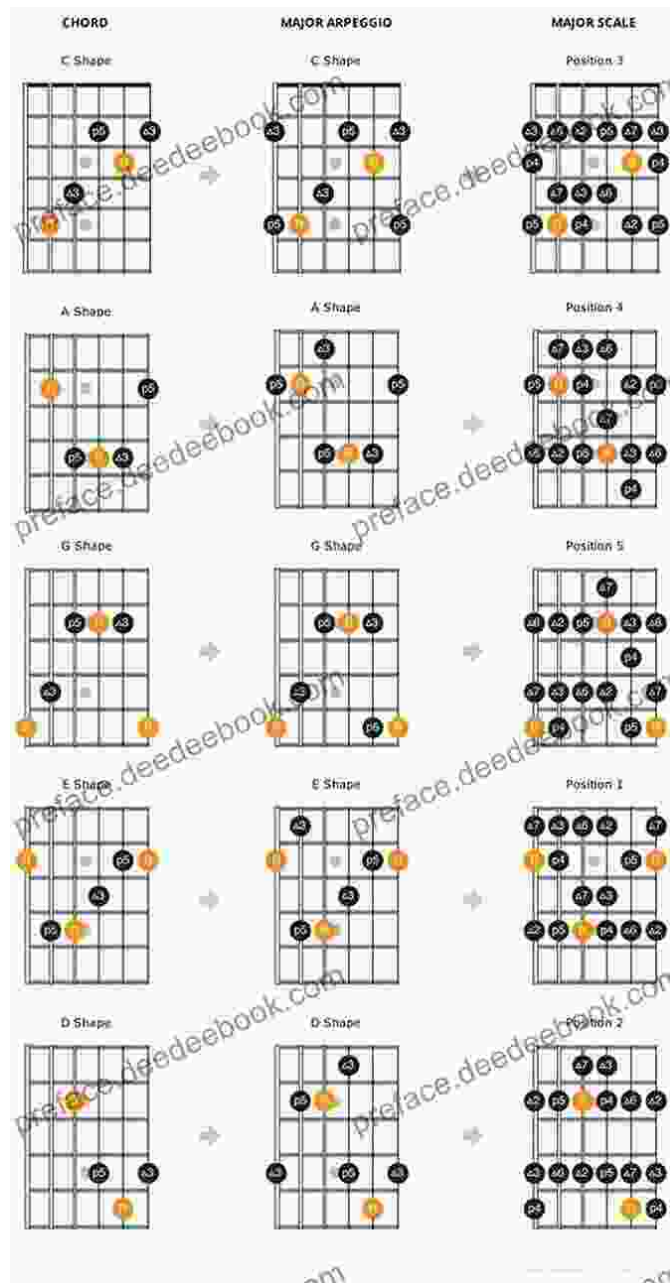

Maj7 Arpeggio Shape

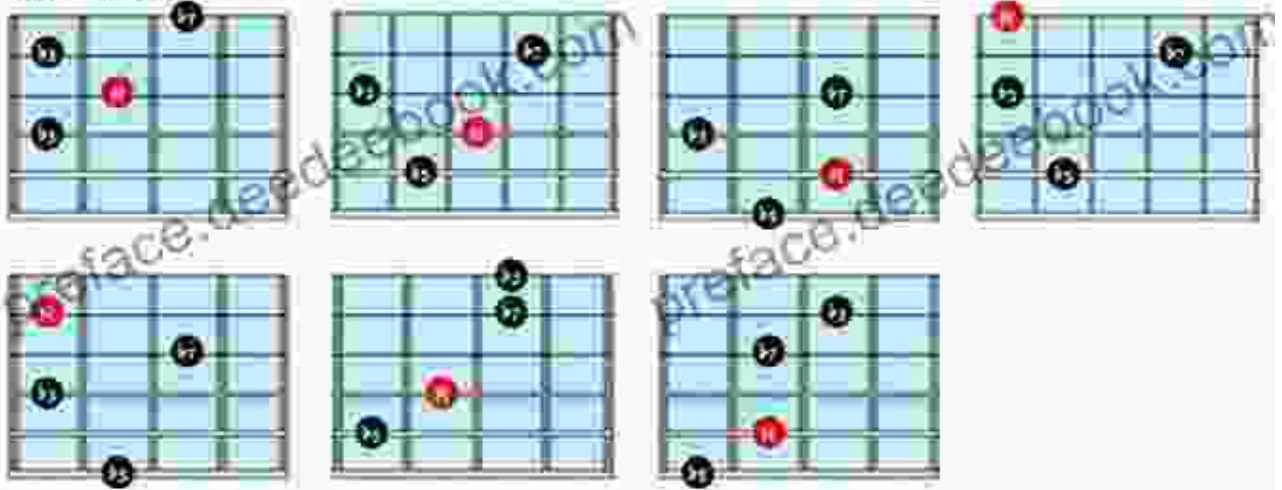

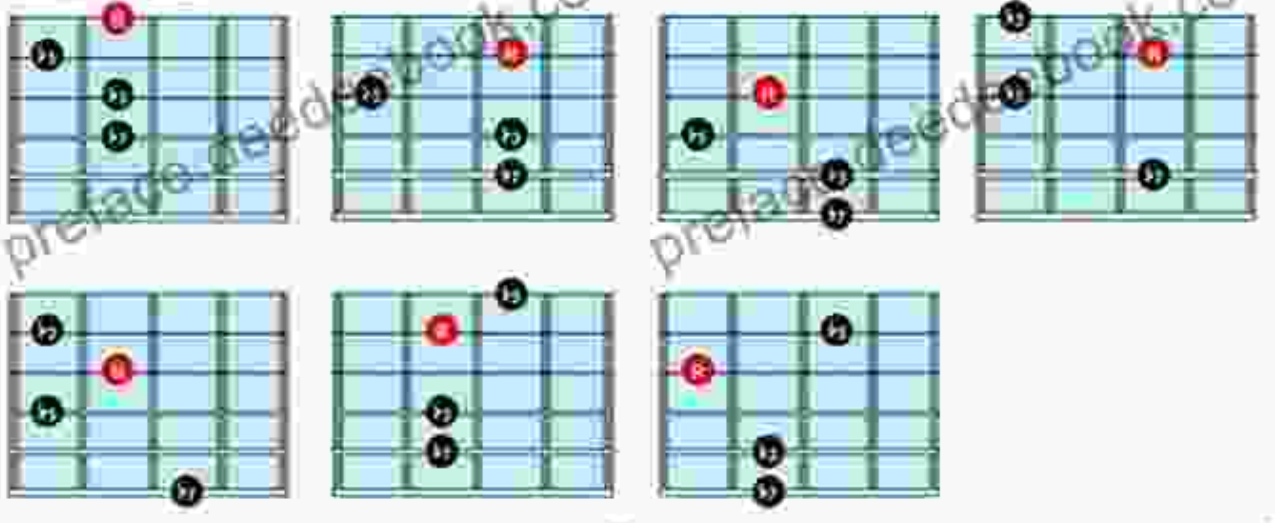
