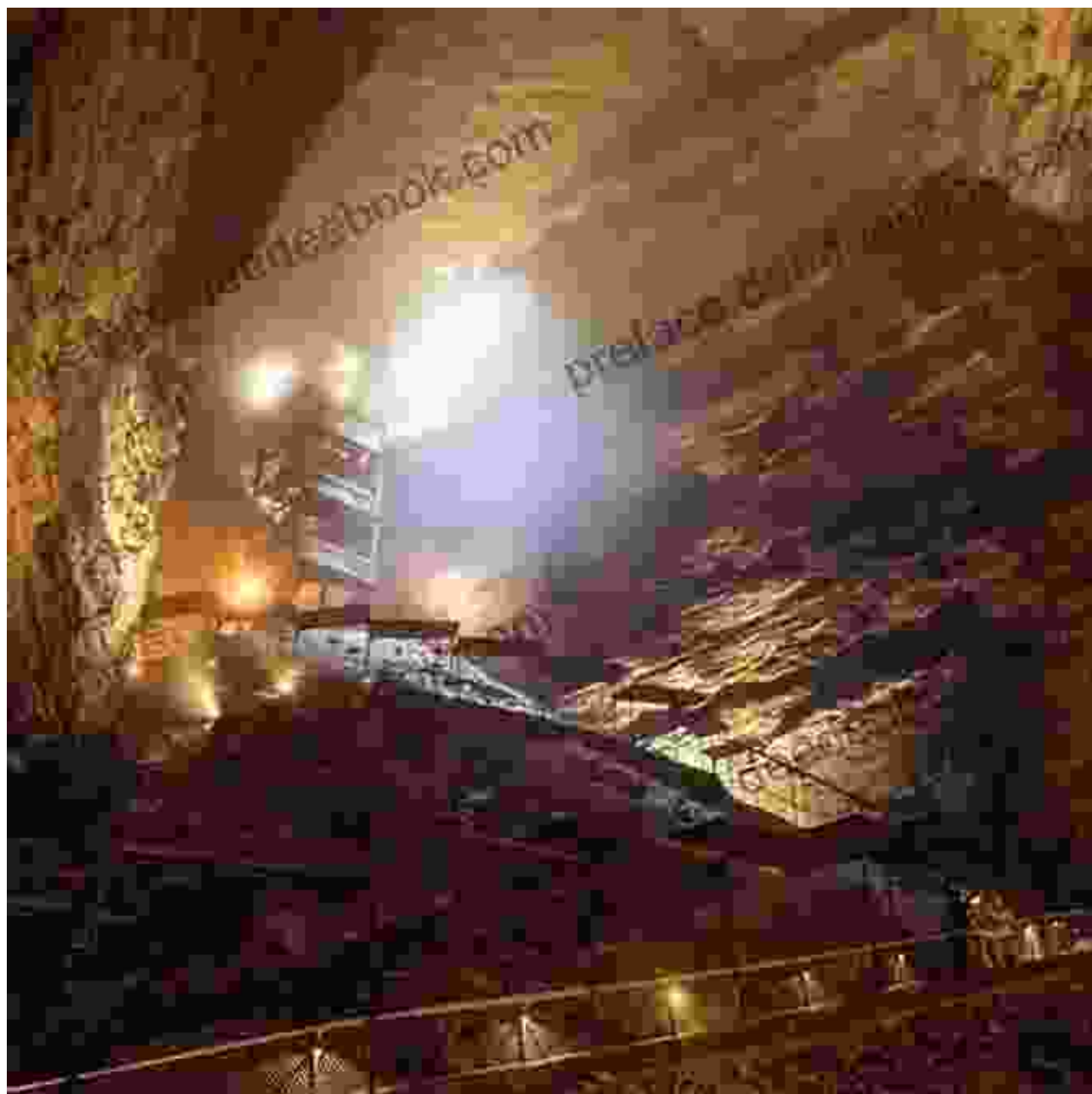
Illinois: Home to the Mississippi's Birthplace and Root Beer Roots

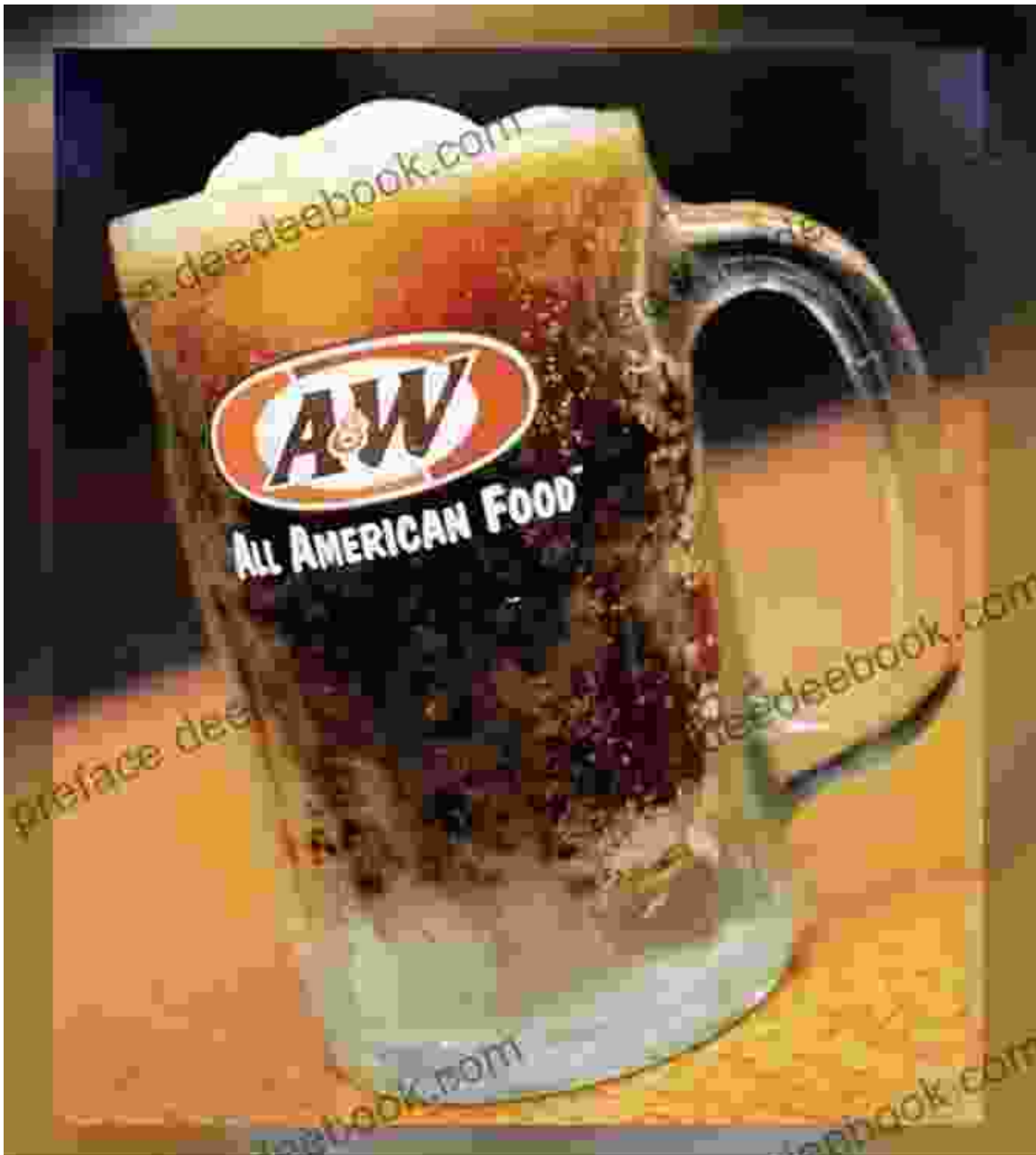
Missouri: The Cave State's Root Beer Adventure
